ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's Mass utilizes a number of well-loved Edwardian-era hymn tunes from Great Britain, along with one famous choral anthem from a large work of the same period. LAUDA ANIMA is surely the example *par excellence* of this style, and the arrangement (by the composer) for four or five verses is the perfect mix of ease and variety for both the listener and singer. The chromatic harmonization of verse three and the thrilling last-verse descant are particular highlights. The text itself is a beautiful metrical paraphrase of Psalm 103. The offertory hymn is RUSTINGTON by C.H.H. Parry, named for the town in Sussex in which he lived toward the end of his life. It is one of the few hymn tunes that has such a comprehensive melody and harmonization that there is little one can do to "gild the lily"! The closing hymn is one of Fr. Frederick Faber, C.O.'s most famous hymn texts. It succinctly expresses the devotional thoughts of the believer after receiving Holy Communion; it even has a thrilling refrain to end each verse, making it ubiquitous for processions and the like. The tune is from early 19th Century Germany. We sing Mass XII from the Kyriale, one of the most melodically-beautiful Gregorian ordinary settings. The *Kyrie*, with its almost weightless motif, is truly hopeful, while its *Gloria* focuses (much as does *Gloria XI*) on recurring motifs (as does much folk music from all around the world). The *Sanctus* and *Agnus Dei* are both Mode II chants of great similarity and great beauty, using the entire range of the mode to express the melody. The post-communion at 11am is John Stainer's most famous piece. "God so loved the world" stands as one of the greatest expressions in English of the comforting words of John 3:16-17. It is relatively straightforward, but depends on the choir maintaining perfect coordination and tuning to get the message across. It is the favorite choral piece of our beloved late Bishop Foley—perhaps you might consider saying a prayer for him while listening (as he so often asked us to do!) The voluntaries before and after Mass are Bach works to be played at the "Bach-a-thon" at Independent Presbyterian Church this Sunday from 1-4pm. The director of music and assistant organist are both featured, along with many other organists in Birmingham, playing various excerpts from Bach's massive output for the pipe organ. The peaceful setting of *Allein Gott* (the German Lutheran version of the *Gloria* from Mass) is one of Bach's most beautiful ornamented chorales. While Bach often set these words in an exuberant fashion, this chorale is very tranquil, suggesting a peaceful atmosphere of adoration. Bach invented a new genre with the trio sonata for organ; the three "players" are now two hands and a pair of feet! This is his sunniest trio: enjoy!
