ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's communion anthem at 11:00am is a miniature by a relatively unknown composer, but is based on one of the most famous pieces of choral music in the world. Robert Stewart was an Irishman who was both professor of music at Trinity College, Dublin, and organist at Dublin's Anglican cathedral. Holding both these positions concurrently shows how industrious this composer was! His 1863 setting of John 14 uses Tallis' famous text, but then expands into other verses so that we receive more of the Gospel text. One hears a little bit of C.V. Stanford in this piece—or perhaps we hear Stewart in Stanford, as he was the more famous composer's teacher. This is a beautiful full anthem in which the text is clearly declaimed. The voluntary after Mass is one of Buxtehude's *praeludia*. These free works are the precursor to Bach's preludes and fugues, which would bring this North German genre to a stunning conclusion. Unlike Böhm's *praeludium* which we heard this past week at Mass, Buxtehude's compositions observe a more traditional model developed in the 17th Century: a rhapsodic introduction grabs the listener's attention and sets the stage; a fugue in four voices (often with a repeated-note theme) proceeds; another freely-composed interlude serves to move the narrative along; another fugue sets forth; a final brilliant coda on the plenum. A pipe organ was a source of parish (and civic) pride in the Hanseatic cities, and so these extroverted *praeludia* were perfect vehicles with which to demonstrate commitment to taste, beauty, and faith!
