
HOLY COMMUNION

	Monday, October 17 7:00PM BYRD ENSEMBLE The internationally-acclaimed Byrd Ensemble, based in the Seattle area, will present “ <i>Illuminating Mortal Sight</i> ”, a concert of Renaissance polyphony, with selections from Byrd, Gombert, Tallis, Taverner, and others.
	Friday, October 21 7:00PM JONATHAN RYAN, organist Mr. Ryan is Director of Music & Organist at Saint Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church in Dallas, and is hailed as one of the premiere young concert organists of our time, giving recitals in major venues in the U.S., France, Germany, and the U.K.
	Saturday, November 5 6:30pm CATHEDRAL CHOIR <i>Staff Singers</i> The Staff Singers of Cathedral Choir anchor the singing for our high-quality sacred music program here at Saint Paul’s. They will perform a number of seasonal selections from our parish repertoire to help us prepare for the season of Advent.
	Sunday, December 4 4:00pm BRUCE E. LUDWICK, JR., organist Bruce is our own Director of Music & Organist at the Cathedral of Saint Paul, and will give his customary Advent organ recital – this year, featuring the <i>Trois Choraes</i> of César Franck, in celebration of his 200th anniversary of birth (December 10, 1822).
	Sunday, January 22 4:00pm JOHANN VEXO, organist Monsieur Vexo is <i>Organiste-de-Choeur</i> at Notre-Dame de Paris, as well as <i>Organiste Titulaire</i> at the Cathédrale Notre-Dame-de-l’Annonciation et Saint-Sigisbert in his hometown of Nancy – which houses the largest Cavaillé-Coll organ outside of Paris.
	Friday, February 17 7:00pm MARK W. HAYES, organist Mr. Hayes is Organist & Choirmaster at Saint Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church in Anniston, as well as owner of Hayes Pipe Organ Service, which services many of the pipe organs around the Southeast – including ours here at the Cathedral!
	Friday, March 24 5:30pm CATHEDRAL CHOIR Choral Stations of the Cross is a venerable and long-standing tradition at the Cathedral of Saint Paul, giving Cathedral Choir an opportunity to practice Holy Week repertoire in a prayerful environment that also aids the congregation’s Lenten meditation.
	Friday, April 28 7:00pm JENS KORNDÖRFER, organist German-born Dr. Jens Korndörfer is based in Atlanta, where he serves as Director of Music & Organist at First Presbyterian Church and directs the organ program at Georgia State. He holds degrees from some of the top schools of Europe and the U.S.

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's Mass utilizes a Gregorian chant ordinary (Kyrie/Gloria/Sanctus/Agnus Dei) as do many of our Masses. This repertoire, specifically requested by Pope St. Paul VI (and all pontiffs since Pope St. Pius X), is a sign of unity in the Liturgy, as we combine our voices (regardless of native idiom) to foreshadow the reality of the heavenly choirs which we hope to join one day! Similarly, we recently introduced another Gregorian Alleluia setting to the parish Masses. You may note that this is but one statement of the word "Alleluia": traditional, the threefold Alleluia was reserved to the season of greatest rejoicing (Eastertide)...but wait! The melisma (many notes) on the last syllable you hear at 8:30 & 11:00am Mass has a purpose...and a name: the *jubilus*! Its use on the last (unaccented) syllable of the Alleluia is an allegory for the eternal rejoicing the Blessed experience in heaven. Ralph Vaughan Williams' anthem "O how amiable" is presented at 11am; its use of Psalm 84 plus the traditional hymn text "O God, our help in ages past" makes sense considering the piece was written for a benefit pageant for a parish church in England! It is a wonderful combination of themes, and we enjoy some of RVW's most beautiful, simple choral writing. Franck's 3rd choral is best described as the most virtuosic, but is (paradoxically) the easiest work of the three to play (although not without pitfalls!) We have the alternation of flourish in the initial arpeggiated figurations with a long-note theme heard on the *Récit* (or Swell) division. This leads to a new theme in the lyric *adagio* (some of Franck's best melodic writing) that eventually presents the third, ascending theme of the choral. A development section combines these themes in dramatic fashion before the initial theme returns with very nearly full organ. Franck once again pulls us back to quieter territory, combining all motives and figurations before a stunning conclusion on the tutti with the addition of the *chamade* (horizontal reed).
