### ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Over the past month, we have presented a few popular Eucharistic texts for the motet repertoire at 11am in juxtaposition. Mozart's setting of the *Ave verum corpus* was followed a week later by the late Colin Mawby's setting; prior to both of those was Orlando di Lasso's *O sacrum convivium*, a masterpiece that utilizes subtle textural changes to create a feeling of timelessness which reflects the heavenly banquet the text describes. Di Lasso is one of the great masters of Renaissance polyphony who worked in Northern and Central Europe. Today's setting of the same text comes from one of the most unappreciated masters of Renaissance polyphony: Cristobal de Morales. Morales is overshadowed by Victoria amongst Spanish polyphonists, but is at least his equal, and when considering technical concerns, his absolute superior. His compositions are pleasing to listen to, but also have excellent "architecture": the polyphony, imitation, and more advanced canonic techniques are all perfectly executed. His *O Sacrum Convivium* is an example of this craftsmanship. Initial statements of the text in slow-moving textures are lightened by the quicker movement of a part at a time, linking similar statements of the initial motive. As the text changes, the harmonic rhythm of the polyphony accelerates (changes in sound are quicker), all leading to serene alleluias at the conclusion. This restful rejoicing is a revelation to the listener!

He hails from the Tuscaloosa area, where he completed his university studies. Besides playing for church services and recitals, he is also a composer. He is a recent convert to Catholicism, too!
	<b>Thursday, November 7 7:00PM UA 'UNIVERSITY SINGERS'</b> The University Singers are the premier vocal ensemble of the School of Music of the University of Alabama, comprised of both music majors and auditioned students from other disciplines, and led by Dr. Morgan Luttig, Director of Choral Activities.
	<b>Sunday, December 1 4:00pm PAUL JACOBS, organist</b> Mr. Jacobs is one of the most sought-after concert organists in the United States and beyond – and the first organist to win a Grammy. Known for his prodigious repertoire and virtuosity, Mr. Jacobs has led the organ department of the Julliard School since 2004.

He will present Dupré's <i>Chemin de la Croix</i> in its full form, with poetry, as the Cathedral's weekly celebration of Stations of the Cross.
	<b>Sunday, May 18 4:00pm BRUCE E. LUDWICK, JR., organist</b> Instead of his customary December concert, our Cathedral Director of Music & Organist will round out and wrap up the 2024-2025 season! Mr. Ludwick, a West Virginia native, has served us at St. Paul's since 2012, together with his wife, Erin, and their four sons.
