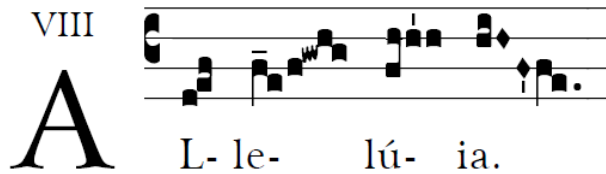

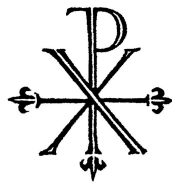

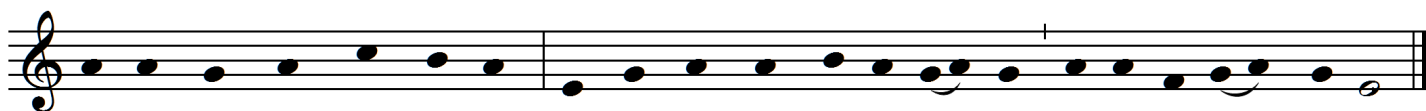

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Cathedral Choir presents three significant works in today's 11am liturgy. Josef Rheinberger's Mass in G minor, Op. 187, was written in mourning of the death of the composer's friend, Johannes Brahms (a name some might know!) Rheinberger was a close friend and confidant of Brahms, a brilliant yet complicated man. Likewise, Rheinberger was a close friend and collaborator of Richard Wagner (a noted not-friend of Brahms!): he was the director of most of Wagner's opera debuts. Rheinberger, born in Liechtenstein but associated with Bavaria most of his life, therefore spanned many chasms as a man and composer. His music united the Bavarian Catholic styles of the time with the Viennese ones, and transcended both. One looks for reasons NOT to call him the most significant Germanic composer of sacred music in the mid-19th Century, perhaps alongside Bruckner. In any case, this Mass is a perfect exemplar of music for mixed women's choir of the Romantic period. It is finely crafted without being unemotional; it is heartfelt without being maudlin. There are many great moments for the individual parts as well as the whole, and so it is a joy to sing...and to hear! Similarly, Rheinberger had many choral settings of antiphons, hymns, and so on. His setting of the offertory *Meditabor* is featured today, too. It is especially expressive and is set in rich, six-voice texture with evocative moments, especially the first few chords, which almost have a "blue note". The piece has a perfect arc: the initial (meditative) statement, intensification through polyphonic imitation, and a final resolution that completes the journey. The postcommunion is John Rutter's setting of Psalm 23. Rutter, a serious composer who rather straddles the line between that and more popular expressions of art music, has written a great deal of music, and this is one of his true gems. It is originally scored for oboe obbligato, accompaniment (including harp!), and choir, but here we feature the Anna Catharine Grace Memorial Pipe Organ's lovely oboe stop, modeled after French 19th century examples. There is lovely unison writing for both men's and ladies voices as well as dramatic depictions of the text. A brilliant crescendo sets the text "...and I will live in the house of the Lord forever" and then also provides a smooth decrescendo. This is a modern classic of the choral repertoire that brilliantly sets Sacred Scripture. Enjoy!

	Sunday, February 23 4:00pm GESUALDO SIX The Gesualdo Six are an award-winning UK ensemble, who will make their Alabama debut here at the Cathedral of Saint Paul. Directed by Owain Park since their founding in 2014, they are known for their imaginative programming and impeccable cohesion.
	Friday, March 14 5:30pm CATHEDRAL CHOIR Choral Stations of the Cross is a venerable and long-standing tradition at the Cathedral of Saint Paul, giving Cathedral Choir an opportunity to preview Holy Week repertoire in a prayerful environment that also aids the congregation's Lenten meditation.
	Friday, April 11 6:30pm FREDERICK TEARDO, organist Dr. Teardo is Director of Music & Organist at nearby Cathedral Church of the Advent and also teaches at Samford University. He will present Dupré's <i>Chemin de la Croix</i> in its full form, with poetry, as the Cathedral's weekly celebration of Stations of the Cross.
	Sunday, May 18 4:00pm BRUCE E. LUDWICK, JR., organist Instead of his customary December concert, our Cathedral Director of Music & Organist will round out and wrap up the 2024-2025 season! Mr. Ludwick, a West Virginia native, has served us at St. Paul's since 2012, together with his wife, Erin, and their four sons.
