

We invite all Catholics who are properly disposed (i.e., in the state of grace and having fasted for one hour before communion) to come forward in the usual way to receive Holy Communion.



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## ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's Mass makes use of a number of favorite hymns, but especially features one singular Gregorian chant. The Gregorian offertory *Jubilate Deo*, sung at 11am, is the longest Gregorian offertory in the repertoire. Far from monotonous, it extends the principle of the *jubilus* (the ornamented, melismatic last syllable of the *Alleluia*) into an entire chant, setting words with similar import to the Alleluia. It is a spontaneous chant of great vigor, sounding almost improvisatory in its jubilation. There truly is nothing else like it! The English composer Thomas Tallis is a singular figure in Renaissance polyphony. His larger pieces (for example, his *Loquebantur variis linguis* for Pentecost) are the equal of any in the repertoire in inspiration and beauty; however, as fate would have it, he is often now remembered for one of his smallest pieces, and one in a language that was rather unfamiliar for his writing. "*If ye love me*" is surely one of the most often-performed anthems of all time; its simple polyphony is accessible, but also offers many opportunities for choral success (or failure, if done poorly!) As always, Tallis is focused on the text, and so he deploys the text "[a]bide with you forever" in homophony (all voices moving as one) to express the truth of this promise given to us by Our Lord in the Gospel of St. John...and given proof at all times in the Tabernacle! We are happy to have our Organ Scholar, Daniel Renna, conduct the piece this week as part of his ongoing formation with us. Thank you for your generosity in contributing to the Music Fund, which allows us to make this opportunity possible for a young musician! The voluntaries before and after Mass are notable pieces; the first a composition of Liszt on a famous *Ave Maria* setting by Arcadelt. The Caecilian movement in Germany revived many such pieces (even adding a bass part to a previously three-voice motet!), and Liszt would have been familiar with this piece and this sort of practice. Renaud's *Toccata* is from a slightly later period, but from France and in the grand tradition of such works in that country. It uses a repetitive, motorhythmic figuration as well as various devices such as circle progressions to build interest. It is a chance for the Assistant Organist to show his skill, for sure!

**Friday, September 27 7:00PM PAUL WEBER, organist**

Dr. Weber is a richly experienced church and concert organist, who also founded the Sacred Music program at Franciscan University of Steubenville. He currently resides in New Orleans, Louisiana, where he is Organist & Choirmaster at Trinity Episcopal.



**Sunday, October 13 4:00PM JAMES McGALLIARD, organist**

The Gesualdo Six are an award-winning UK ensemble, who will make their Alabama début here at the Cathedral of Saint Paul. Directed by Owain Park since their founding in 2014, they are known for their imaginative programming and impeccable cohesion.



**Friday, March 14 5:30pm CATHEDRAL CHOIR**

Choral Stations of the Cross is a venerable and long-standing tradition at the Cathedral of Saint Paul, giving Cathedral Choir an opportunity to preview Holy Week repertoire in a prayerful environment that also aids the congregation's Lenten meditation.



**Friday, April 11 6:30pm FREDERICK TEARDO, organist**

Dr. Teardo is Director of Music & Organist at nearby Cathedral Church of the Advent and also teaches at Samford University. He will present Dupré's *Chemin de la Croix* in its full form, with poetry, as the Cathedral's weekly celebration of Stations of the Cross.



**Sunday, May 18 4:00pm BRUCE E. LUDWICK, JR., organist**

Instead of his customary December concert, our Cathedral Director of Music & Organist will round out and wrap up the 2024-2025 season! Mr. Ludwick, a West Virginia native, has served us at St. Paul's since 2012, together with his wife, Erin, and their four sons.
