

## ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Tonight, Cathedral Choir is honored to present one of the seminal choral works of the past century, Maurice Duruflé's *Messe cum jubilo*. Duruflé is one of the greatest 20th Century composers, and his story starts in a Cathedral (and in a choir) like ours, albeit in Rouen, France. Growing up in the choir of men and boys there, Duruflé received a thorough grounding in Gregorian chant, piano, and organ. These influences would inform his entire compositional output. Enormously self-critical, his small body of compositions is of extraordinary quality. This Mass and Duruflé's *Requiem* prominently feature chant melodies—unsurprising, as he grew up during the ascent of the Liturgical Movement in the Catholic Church. In the case of today's Mass, it uses the eponymous Mass IX «*cum jubilo*» appointed to feasts of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Duruflé treats the chant with great subtlety and care. Apparently, questions about reconciling the given rhythms with chant interpretation inevitably received a shrug from the composer and his wife, meaning “do it as you'd sing the chant”. This attitude brings the composition to life! Movements range from tranquil (*Kyrie*) to exuberant (*Gloria*) to mysterious (*Agnus Dei*). There is a marked shift to a more subdued mood during the movements which occur during the Canon of the Mass. One understands that Duruflé sees the polyphonic Ordinary as part of the liturgical action—neither submissive or overbearing, but an invitation to the action of the Holy Spirit himself. Even the solo section of the *Gloria* and the only solo movement (the *Benedictus*) are modest and elegant, but full of fervor and emotion. This Mass is Duruflé's compositional ethos at its purest. Duruflé was deeply devout and wished to contribute to the liturgical life of the Church, period. There is not a record of conflict with “the authorities” as there is with contemporaries Messiaen or Langlais. As such, one wonders if this work is subtitled “*à une voix/in one voice*” as a plea to the entire Church to continually offer musical truth and beauty to God in the Sacred Liturgy by presenting works such as this. We are certainly blessed, in the Anna Catharine Grace Memorial Pipe Organ, to have one of the best vehicles in North America to communicate this beautiful piece!

The Gregorian Alleluia II and offertory antiphon for this solemnity are two of the most beautiful and striking in the repertoire and particularly suited to women's voices. We continue to seek here at the Cathedral to present the “treasures of sacred music” (cf. SC #114), especially Gregorian chant, in the Sacred Liturgy. The postcommunion setting of the *Ave Maria* by Franck is a classic setting for solo voice (although sung here by the Cathedral Choir staff singers) that should be much more well-known. An achingly beautiful melody combines with characteristic Franck touches (canons, especially!) that are familiar from his *Panis Angelicus* and many other works. The organ literature before and after Mass is from Marcel Dupré's *Ave Maris Stella* suite, one of three “books” that make up a collection of pieces he originally improvised at Vespers at Notre-Dame-de-Paris in 1920. (NB: *Ave Maris Stella* is the Vespers hymn for the season after Pentecost in the traditional breviary.) The man who would make Rolls-Royce a household name, Charles Goodman Johnson, was in the congregation. After hearing the pieces, he wrote to M. Dupré, asking for a copy of the sheet music. After the composer confirmed they were improvised, “CJ” promptly commissioned the set of pieces. They have since become a cornerstone of the French organ literature.
