




ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Today, we present one of Thomas Tallis' first English-language anthems. The English Reformation brought many hardships and travails to Catholics in England; Tallis' situation was especially complicated as he was arguably the most famous composer in England...and a Catholic. Employed directly by the Queen in her Chapel Royal, he had compositional and performance duties there. Although there are few first-hand sources, you might read Kerry McCarthy's "Tallis", which admirably collects these (and is fun to read). As the language of the liturgy in the chapel changed, so did Tallis' style for said group: there are fewer parts, objectively easier textures, and simpler text settings. "O Lord, give Thy Holy Spirit" is an early example of this (along with "If ye love me" and others). Unfortunate history aside, it is a lovely miniature. The voluntaries before and after Mass are by the Belgian composer-organist Flor Peeters. A church musician as well, his music achieved great circulation in the 20th Century (he is Bishop Raica's favorite composer of liturgical music!) His *Aria* is his most famous organ piece, while the *Suite Modale* is his contribution to a genre of the same name that was very popular from the 1930s-1950s. Charming and (in the *Scherzo*) whimsical, Peeters' gift for melody is always on display, while his skills at orchestration are as well, even if the registration suggestions in the pieces played today are minimal (as they were intended for a broad audience of organists). Enjoy!
